Message from Mayor Steven Del Duca

Dear neighbour,

Two years ago, I took the oath of office to become your Mayor.

Representing you, and delivering more for you, is a responsibility that I take very seriously.

As I promised on my first day on the job, I am 100 per cent committed to fighting traffic gridlock, keeping you and your family safe, and delivering more homes particularly for first-time homebuyers.

Two years later, and we're making good progress on all of these priorities – but I know our work is not yet done.

The Kirby Road Extension and the Canada Drive-America Avenue Bridge are under construction, and the Bass Pro Mills Drive extension to Weston Road will start construction before the end of this Council term.

This fall, York Regional Police (YRP) opened a new substation in the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre. And in partnership with YRP, we have announced that a brand new substation will be opening in Kleinburg in early 2025. This second substation will help to protect residents who live in Kleinburg and Woodbridge.

Together we are working to tackle auto theft, home break-ins and gun crime in our community because we know that criminals belong behind bars and not on our streets. We will make sure YRP has the money needed to hire more officers so that there's a stronger police presence in our neighbourhoods.

We've decided to invest a lot of money into the infrastructure needed to build more housing because we know that most parents and grandparents in Vaughan want their kids and grandkids to be able to buy a home close to where they grew up. As a father of two young girls, that's important to me. Home prices will only come down if we build more, and we are well on our way to delivering 42,000 more homes over the next 10 years.

We've gotten a lot done, but I know there is still much more that you need. I won't rest until we get the job done, and you can always count on me to keep fighting for you and your family.

New York Regional Police (YRP) Substation coming in 2025!



The safety of residents is a top priority for Mayor Steven Del Duca and Vaughan Council and that's why strong and decisive action is being taken to fight back against the auto-thefts, home break-ins and gun crimes that too many local residents have experienced.

Mayor Del Duca and Members of Council recently joined YRP Chief Jim MacSween and members of YRP's Executive Leadership Team to announce that a brand-new YRP substation will be opening in Kleinburg in early 2025!

This new facility, which will be located at 10418 Islington Ave., will mean more YRP officers will have a stronger and more visible police presence in both Kleinburg and Woodbridge.

Mayor Del Duca will continue to push urgently for real bail reform so that the criminals negatively impacting Vaughan residents can be kept off our streets and behind bars where they belong.

This is another example of strong leadership that is delivering for you.

Our winter response

Before a snowfall

Before a snowfall, the City prepares roads by spraying brine, a liquid made of rock salt and water. It is sprayed on the road to prevent the formation of black ice before a winter snow event.

During a snowfall

During a heavy snowfall or major storm, the City will salt and clear sidewalks in main public areas before moving to residential areas.

Plowing begins as soon as five centimetres of snow have accumulated on public roads and sidewalks. Main roads are plowed first within four hours to keep them clear for emergency and transit vehicles before moving to residential areas.

After a snowfall

The City offers a windrow-clearing service to residents within four hours after the plow has passed. The residential windrow-clearing machines clear a portion of the home's driveway entrance to allow a car to pass through. Residential streets are treated within 12 hours after a snowfall has ended. Sidewalks are cleared within 48 hours after a snowfall has ended.

Put safety in the driver's seat this winter!

During the winter, blowing snow, icy roads and poor visibility can make driving challenging. Follow these winter road safety tips:

Keep an emergency winter survival kit in your vehicle. The kit should include a charged phone, water, non-perishable food, flashlight, blanket, warm clothes, jumper cables, shovel, ice-scraper, traction mats or sand, washer fluid that works down to -40 C, candles and a lighter or matches. Ensure your car has winter tires and its maintenance is up to date. Keep your fuel tank at least half full to help reduce moisture in the fuel system and add extra weight to the vehicle.

Before driving, clean snow or ice off all surfaces of your vehicle. Snow left on your



car can obstruct your view while driving, which could lead to an accident. Depending on the weather conditions, it may take you longer to arrive at your destination; always leave extra time to get where you need to go.

Don't park vehicles on the road during snowfalls - it's the law

When driving, pay close attention to the road far ahead and match your speed to the road signs and weather conditions. Since it takes longer to stop on a slippery road, brake earlier and leave more distance than normal between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you. If there is poor visibility, turn on your headlights to make your car easier for other road users to see, and avoid passing other vehicles when weather and road conditions make it difficult to do so. Lastly, keep a safe distance from snowplows and salting equipment.

We're winter ready - are you?

The City is dedicated to providing you with efficient, reliable and high-level winter services. With a fleet of more than 230 vehicles, we are ready to take on the Canadian weather with salting, windrow-clearing, plowing and snow removal along more than 2,200 lane-kilometres of roads and more than 1,200 kilometres of sidewalks and park walkways.

Remember, we all have an important role to play to keep our winter operations running smoothly. Here are some ways you help our crews:

- Don't park cars on the street while snowplows are out.
- Clear snow and ice from sidewalks bordering your property to help ensure roads and sidewalks remain safe.
- On collection days, set waste bins back from the curb approximately one metre – and don't put them on top of snowbanks.
- Keep fire hydrants on your property clear and accessible at all times (one metre all around).



- Remove anything from your property that may interfere with or be hazardous to plow crews – like basketball nets or landscaping features.
- Be mindful of where shoveled snow is placed. It is illegal to shovel snow or ice onto the road.
- Stay off the roads during a heavy snowstorm unless it is essential to go out.
- Clean snow off all surfaces of your vehicle before driving and stay well back from snowplows and salting equipment.

Protect your pipes

Just as you bundle up for the winter, you also need to keep your home's water pipes warm. Low temperatures can cause pipes to freeze, leak or burst if they are not protected from the cold. Make sure your pipes are properly insulated and your home is kept above 8 C (46 F), especially near the water meter.

Gallanough Park improvements complete!



Good news: Improvements at Gallanough Park are now complete! The City undertook important municipal infrastructure improvements

to the stormwater management facility at Gallanough Park (21 Springfield Way) to combat the risk of flooding during heavy rainstorms and to ensure this park remains a place families can enjoy for generations to come.

In addition, the City also revitalized the Ward 5 neighbourhood park. It now features a new games table with seating, playground and ground-play features with accessible ramps and a wheelchair glider, accessible engineered wood fibre safety surfacing, swing area with an accessible swing seat, new accessible walkways with upgraded lighting and furnishings, new outdoor fitness equipment at five fitness stations

throughout the park, new pollinator gardens and a shade structure, which is coming soon!

A celebration to mark the park's completion was held on Nov. 12. Members of the community were invited to join Mayor Steven Del Duca and Members of Council to listen to official remarks, enjoy an interactive DJ and free refreshments.

The park's improvements were funded in part by the Government of Canada.

Old electronics

If you've upgraded your devices recently, you may be looking to dispose of old ones. Electronic waste can be safely disposed of at a [York Region Waste Depot](#). **Do not place electronics in the garbage or blue box.**

There are a couple of other environmentally friendly options for getting rid of your old electronics:

- Donate gently used or old – but in good working condition – electronics to friends and family, a local charity or a second-hand shop.
- Visit recyclemyelectronics.ca to search Vaughan's nearest retail recycling location by postal code.

Aluminum trays, black plastic containers and disposable cutlery

Emptied and rinsed aluminum trays can be disposed of in the blue box – be sure to wash away all food residues. And while some plastic containers are recyclable, black plastic is not. Toss black plastic in the garbage – including black plastic forks, knives, spoons and containers.

Paper plates, paper towels and napkins

These items go in the green bin. Place your green bin items in compostable bags if you can, but plastic bags are also accepted. **Please tie bags securely.**



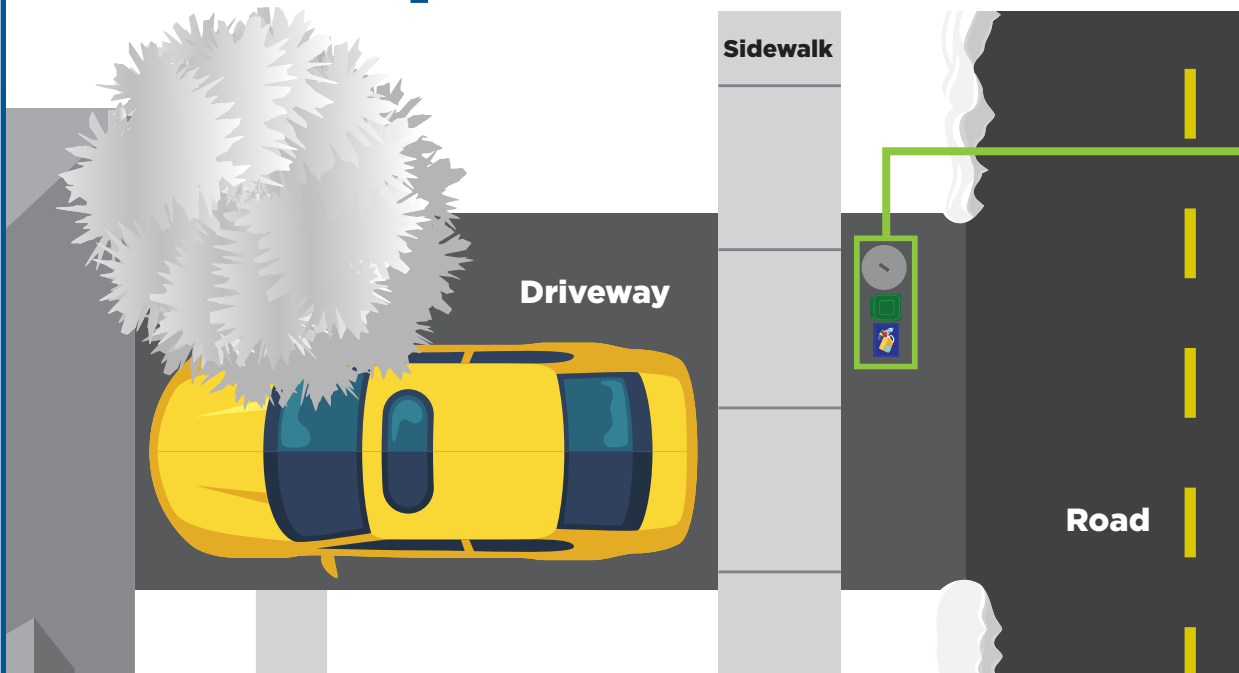
Never pour fats, oils and grease down the drain

Cooking or baking? Remember that fats, oils and grease – such as butter, olive oil, gravy and meat fat – can clog pipes and cause sewer backups if poured down the drain. Instead, let these substances cool and harden, then scrape them into the green bin.

We're enhancing Kleinburg Village!

The City of Vaughan is undertaking important infrastructure improvements within Kleinburg Village, including watermain replacements, road reconstruction work and streetscaping enhancements. These improvements support the City's continued commitment to ensuring the long-term sustainability of municipal infrastructure.

Important watermain work was completed in 2024 in the following locations throughout the area:

- Nashville Road, from Highway 27 to Islington Avenue
- Islington Avenue, from Nashville Road to Bell Court
- Islington Avenue, from Kellam Street to Stegman's Mill Road
- Islington Avenue, from Nashville Road to Kellam Street

Work is currently paused and will resume in spring 2025, weather permitting. Construction is anticipated to be completed by summer 2026.

Vaughan's 11th fire station set to open in 2026



Work begins on the City's newest fire hall, Fire Station 7-12! In October, the City and Vaughan Fire and Rescue Service (VFRS) broke ground at 9511 Weston Rd. to mark the start of construction for Vaughan's 11th fire station. Fire Station 7-12 will support VFRS' emergency responses from neighbouring stations – Fire Station 7-7, Fire Station 7-5 and Fire Station 7-9. As a result, response times in this area, and city-wide, will improve. Fire Station 7-12 will be approximately

875 square metres, with access to two apparatus bays directly off Weston Road. Set to open in 2026, this station will bring emergency response and fire services closer to home for everyone in the Vellore Village community.

Connecting Canada Drive and America Avenue



In May 2024, the City of Vaughan broke ground to build a bridge over Highway 400, connecting Canada Drive and America Avenue. Once complete, the bridge will enhance Vaughan's transportation network, alleviate gridlock and allow residents to travel seamlessly from one community to another.

The bridge will include a two-lane road with sidewalks and bicycle lanes on both sides, and will improve traffic movement in the area. It will offer better access to local amenities, create access to enhanced transit systems and help emergency services response times.

The bridge is anticipated to be complete in 2026.

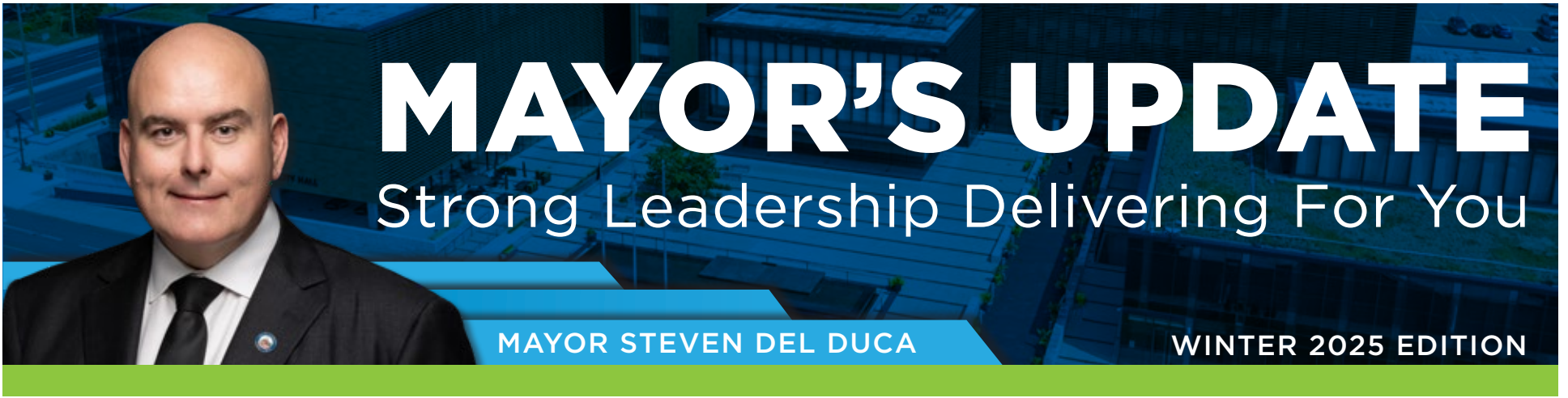

New YRP substation opens at Vaughan Metropolitan Centre



A significant milestone in community safety has been delivered with the opening of the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre (VMC) police substation on Oct. 11. As the area is projected to welcome new residents in the coming years, this new facility is essential for addressing the needs of a rapidly growing population.

Located at 100 New Park Place, the 4,800-square-foot substation offers a welcoming environment for community members to interact with York Regional Police (YRP) officers, file reports and obtain crime prevention information. Staffed Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., this substation exemplifies proactive policing efforts and community engagement.

The VMC development will also include extensive office space, creating jobs and housing in York Region. By partnering with builders and developers, YRP is committed to keeping community safety a top priority as Vaughan evolves. Together, we are laying the groundwork for a safer future!

Making housing more affordable for families

Mayor Steven Del Duca and Vaughan City Council have taken significant steps to make housing more affordable in the city.

Ensuring affordability and accessibility, especially for young families, is a key priority for Vaughan. This includes taking strong action to give homebuyers a break and to get shovels in the ground to build new housing.

To tackle the housing affordability crisis, Mayor Del Duca and Council recently approved reductions to the City's residential development charge rates, which were previously among the highest in the Greater Toronto Area.

Development charges are fees that municipalities impose to fund infrastructure, but they are also a cost that is passed on directly to homebuyers as this fee is embedded in the purchase price when they buy a home.

Before this change, the City's development charge for low-rise residential properties was \$94,466 per unit. Under the new structure, the rate will be reduced to \$50,193.



This is a clear example of Vaughan leading the way when it comes to delivering relief for homebuyers.

Slow down in community safety zones!



Road safety is a leading priority for the City. That is why the City is working towards implementing an Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) program within Community Safety Zones, including school zones. Starting in 2025, ASE cameras will be live across the city to ensure that vehicles travelling in excess of the posted speed limits in designated Community Safety Zones are caught on camera. The City took a data-driven approach to identify locations for the speed cameras to ensure we target areas where speeding is a concern.

The ASE program is just one of the many ways the City is working to reduce speeding in Vaughan through the MoveSmart Mobility Management Strategy, which helps form and direct the City's vision to provide a safer, more efficient and sustainable transportation system.

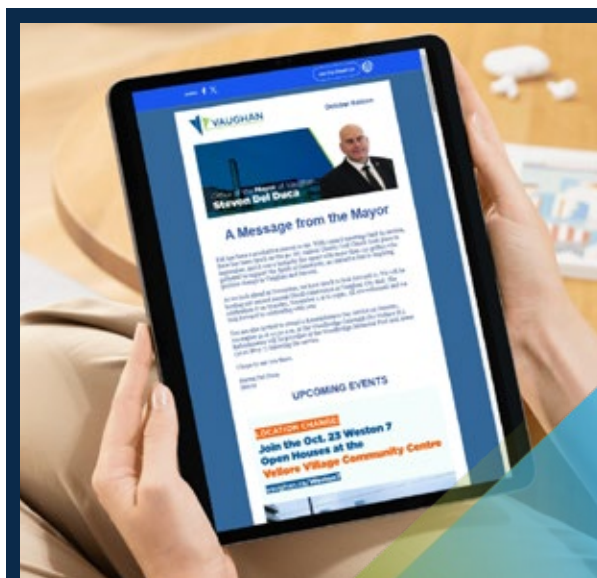

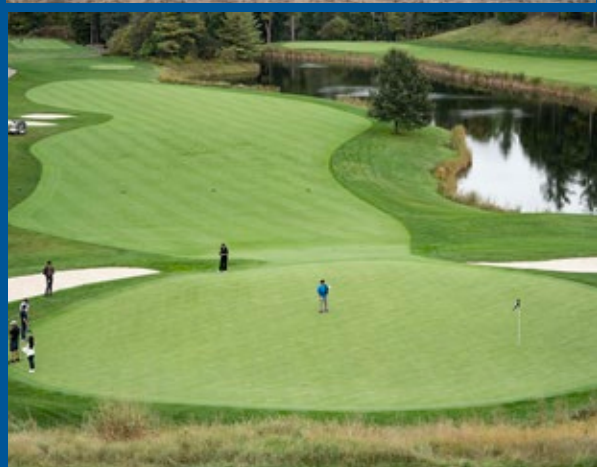

Delivering on housing: Vaughan welcomes \$35 million investment!

This funding will play a crucial role in developing stormwater and wastewater infrastructure in the VMC, paving the way for the construction of 20,424 new homes.

Vaughan has received the largest funding allocation among Ontario municipalities, underscoring the city's potential

New LiUNA Training Centre now open in Vaughan



Vaughan is thrilled to announce the arrival of a cutting-edge training centre for construction workers, backed by a substantial \$26 million investment from Ontario's Skills Development Fund (SDF). Mayor Steven Del Duca alongside Premier Doug Ford revealed that the new facility at LiUNA 183 will significantly boost training capabilities, preparing nearly 50,000 additional skilled trades workers and doubling the centre's overall capacity to nearly 100,000.

This training centre will offer hands-on education in high-demand fields like bricklaying and heavy equipment operation. It's a critical response to Vaughan's rapid growth and the broader skilled trades shortage in Ontario. Through the Spirit of Generosity, Mayor Del Duca and Members of Council are creating hope and making a real difference in the lives of individuals in Vaughan.

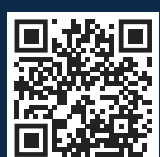

Budget 2025: Strong Leadership Delivering For You

Building a city that works for everyone and is guided by Strong Leadership Delivering For You is the focus of the City of Vaughan's [2025 Budget and 2026 Financial Plan](#) (PDF). Brought forward by Mayor Steven Del Duca, and adopted by Vaughan Council on Dec. 17, the budget presents a balanced approach rooted in respect for taxpayers, while highlighting Council's hard work to address the cost of living, community safety and tackling traffic gridlock.

The 2025 property tax-supported gross operating budget includes a three per cent property tax levy increase, which means an additional \$4.73 per month on the average property tax bill. The combined 2025 rate increase for the water, wastewater and stormwater budgets means an additional \$3.44 per month on the average water and wastewater bill per household.

With this, Vaughan remains one of the lowest and most competitive tax rates in the Greater Toronto Area.

Vaughan businesses continue to invest in our city

Four recent investments have brought more than \$170 million in economic activity to Vaughan and highlight expansion in Vaughan's advanced manufacturing sector. In 2023, the city's manufacturing sector contributed nearly \$4 billion in economic output, as measured by real gross domestic product.



Hanon Systems – a global leader in automotive parts manufacturing – is investing more than \$155 million to build a new 284,200-square-foot plant in Woodbridge to advance Ontario's electric vehicle (EV) supply chain. The new facility, which expands on the company's existing Vaughan location, is set to create 300 local jobs in addition to the 550 employees Hanon's Vaughan location currently employs. This state-of-the-art facility will be the company's first North American location to produce electric scroll compressors – an essential component for EVs – and will be capable of producing up to 900,000 e-compressors annually.



Clover Tool Manufacturing Limited – another key player in Vaughan's automotive landscape – is investing \$15 million to update their facility to enhance its capability to support Vaughan and Ontario's thriving automotive sector. This is in addition to the more than \$1.8 million in support the company has received through the Government of Ontario's Advanced Manufacturing and Innovation Competitiveness program.



Arla Foods Canada – a global leader in food, with its Canadian headquarters in Vaughan – recently announced the grand opening of their new refrigerated warehousing facility in Vaughan. This new addition to the company's footprint and continued investment in its facilities is a proof point of the competitive and growing agri-food and food processing cluster in the city.



Ruggable – a Los-Angeles-based, e-commerce home goods company revolutionizing the market with designed-forward washable rugs – recently opened its first Canadian plant right here in Vaughan. Ruggable's new plant is a valuable addition to Vaughan's advanced manufacturing sector.

The City takes great pride in providing an exceptional quality of life and standard of living that is second to none. One of the ways the City achieves this objective is through the Grow with Vaughan horticulture sponsorship program in support of beautification across the city.

Local businesses are invited to sponsor a City flowerbed, pollinator bed or flowerpot at one of 56 key locations across Vaughan. Each location is priced based on traffic counts, size and visibility in the surrounding area.


Participating businesses will benefit from turn-key, targeted brand exposure for one

full year, from June 2025 to May 2026. When sponsored, a sign will be installed at the location that includes program branding along with the logo and contact information of the sponsoring business. Sponsorship includes the design, fabrication and installation of branded signage and the maintenance of the sponsored flowerbed, pollinator bed or flowerpot.

- **Speaking in person:**
Attend a meeting in person at Vaughan City Hall (2141 Major Mackenzie Dr.).
- **Joining virtually:**
Speak live via teleconference to the Mayor and Members of Council during a meeting.

- **Calling in:**
Speak live from a telephone (regular landline or cellphone) during a meeting.
- **Emailing:**
Submit a written communication for review by Members of Council.
